Views within the DPZ are intermittently controlled by the woodland and plantation dispersed consistently throughout the area. The A631 roughly demarkates a ridgeline from which land falls north and south. There are no exchange of views therefore between northern and southern halves, and although a lack of hedgerows allow medium-distance views within the southern portion, these are best afforded from higher ground due to the easwes undulating nature of the ground. Visibility along the A631 is also intermittent due to the location of Gringley on the Hill alongside, and the incidence of tree planting along much of its course.

Although the larger roundabouts are not characteristic of a rural setting or village, the main road does bypass the village and therefore does not impinge upon the character of the village, even if it does alter the setting to a degree.

Modern development is located to the east and south: the latter is adjacent to the A161/A631 junction, largely bungalows, but not recent. To the south lies the newer built development, where some attempt has been made to reflect the vernacular style.

Overall Condition Summary Statement

Condition of the landscape is relatively intact, excepting road improvements involving the increased influence of th roundabout junctions on the local landscape around Beckingham, and localised loss of hedgerow sections. Species diversity appears to be reasonably good within hedgerows, tree lines and along verges (either herbs or scrub vegetation), although this is under threat due to lack of mature hedgerow replanting, or through intended and permanent removal.

The villages retain their traditional character with strong cores; North Wheatley little changed entirely. Field pattern is more intact closer to the villages, with areas showing partial loss of hedgerow boundaries lying south of Walkeringham, North of North Wheatley, and west of Saundby.

While field rationalisation has taken place within central parts where land use is principally arable, there still remains a good proportion of the agricultural landscape divided into small and medium-sized parcels. Some hedgerows are falling into decline - and the number of hedgerow trees falling - due to age and lack of management which could be rectified through localised replanting. However, the railway lines cutting across the landscape along two routes do interrupt some of the original structure, and proportionately North Leverton and South Wheatley have a high percentage of newer build or older development that is non-vernacular than is observed in other Mid-Nottinghamshire Farmland villages. Overall, excepting the railway lines the landsape is in comparatively good condition.

Gaps or missing sections are not uncommon, although this appears to be less prevalent in areas comprising a series of smaller fields. Some taller lengths of hedge are located in the south-west corner; noted for their value and species rich verges.

The general character of the DPZ remains largely intact, represented by a collection of settlements of varying size within an arable landscape with a significant woodland to the west. However, this is impacted upon by a change in the structure of the landscape, principally through the construction of the A1 and railway lines and expansion of Tuxford (including peripheral land use changes such as the warehousing estates), combined with the loss of the historic field pattern as a result of field rationalisation and lack of field boundary management. The impacts themselves are relatively localised (physically or visually), however urban expansion has an increasing affect on the character of the landscape, as does the degradation of some hedgerows.
