Welcome to the Priory Church of Our Lady and St Cuthbert.

For over 900 years, men and women have brought their life experiences, good and bad, happy and sad, to this place; we follow in their footsteps. This Church has been a place of sanctuary, of reconciliation of forgiveness, of hope for the town and area; may it be that for you today. This is a place where God is experienced and where his children, you and me, are welcomed and refreshed. In gathering today, we are part of the history of this place, attending to what is right and good, just and true, for our own lives, and those of others, particularly the needy and vulnerable.

In remembering those who gave their lives in the pursuit of peace, we give thanks for their sacrifice. We remember too, all civilians who have lost their lives through acts of violence. Finally, we pray for those who serve today in the armed forces.

An induction loop is fitted here; please switch to T to use it.

As is traditional to call us to worship and in remembrance of our War Dead, the Priory Bell ringers will ring the Church bells half muffled.

To remember those who died and are listed in the Lady Chapel (a war memorial in its own right) 528 candles will burn before the altar throughout the service.

It would be appreciated if silence could be observed whilst waiting for the service to begin.
